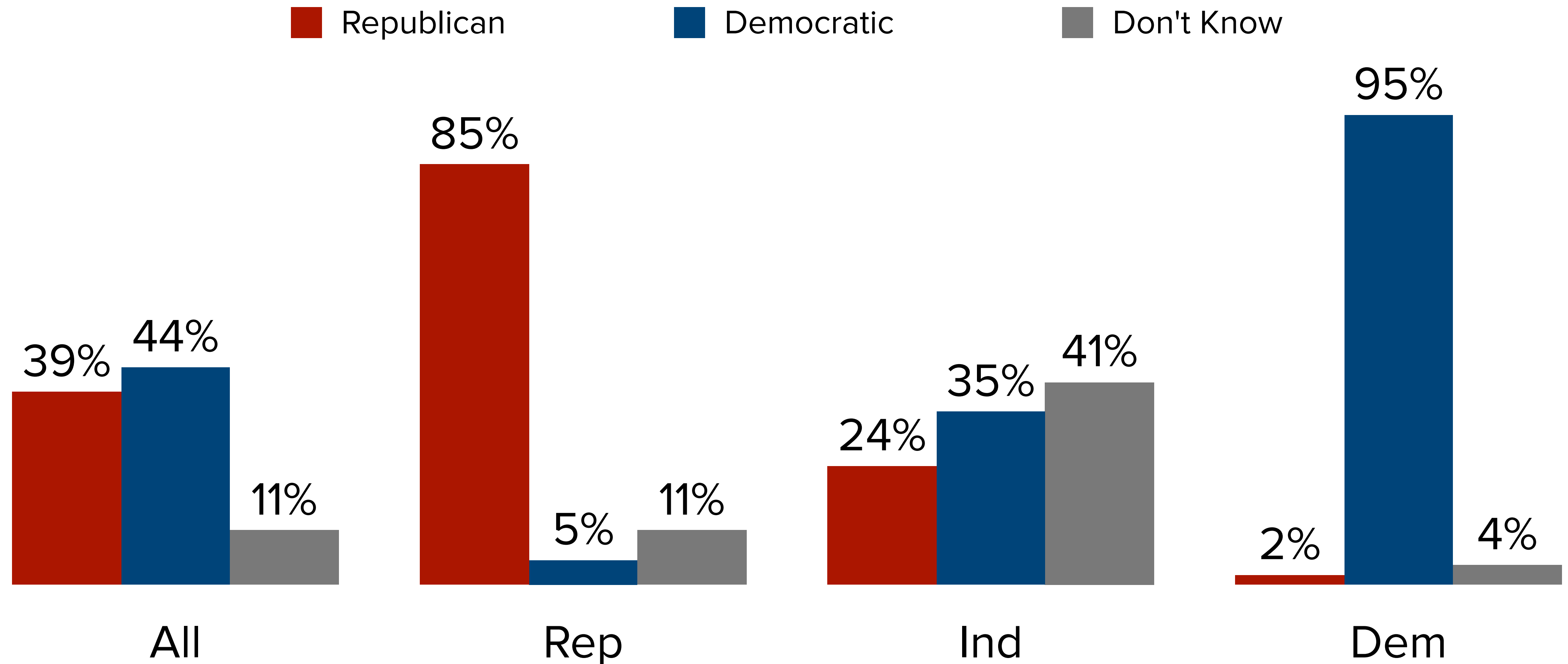

Methodology

- Survey conducted March 10-18, 2021.
- 1150 registered voters in AZ, FL, GA, MO, NC, NH, NV, OH, PA, and WI interviewed online.
- Sample is an online panel, matched to voter file.
- Overall quotas set for state, gender, race/ethnicity, education, and age to reflect past participation.
- Margin of error for the full sample is $\pm 2.89\%$.

Swing-state voters are up for grabs on health care.

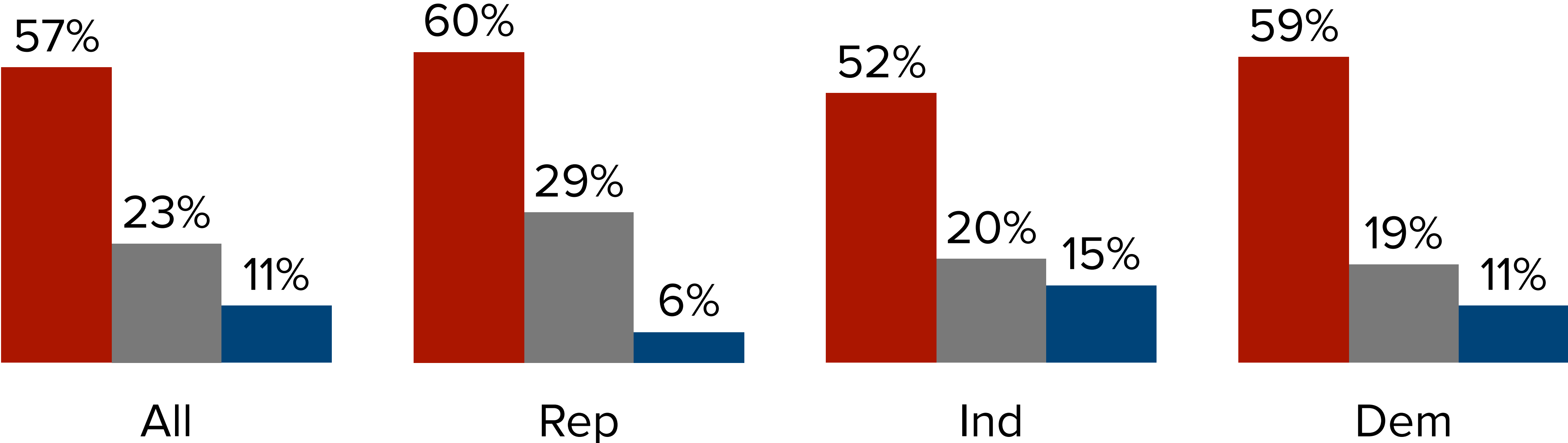
Generally speaking, whom do you trust more on the issue of health care (ROTATE: the Republican Party or the Democratic Party)?



Voters want Republicans to have a clear plan for health care ...

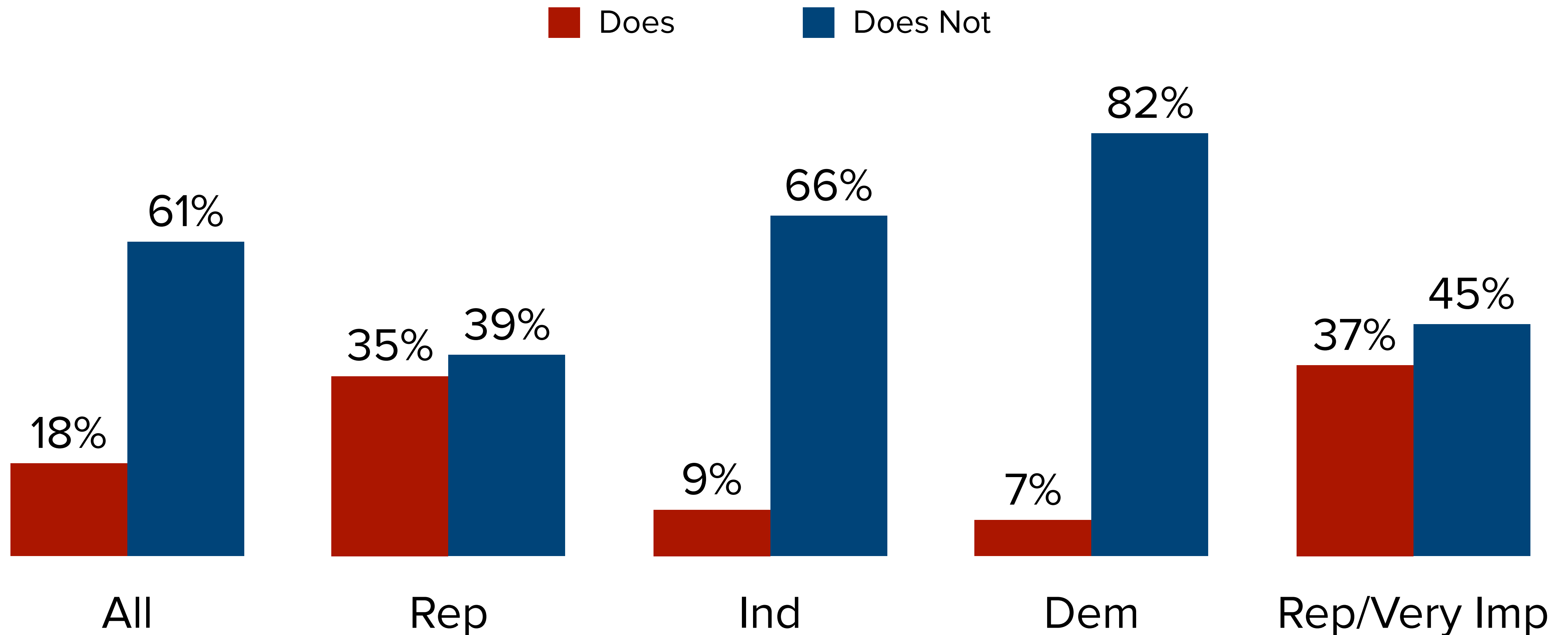
How important do you think it is for the Republican Party to have a clear plan for health care: very important, somewhat important, not too important, or not at all important?

■ Very Important ■ Somewhat Important ■ Not Too/At All Important



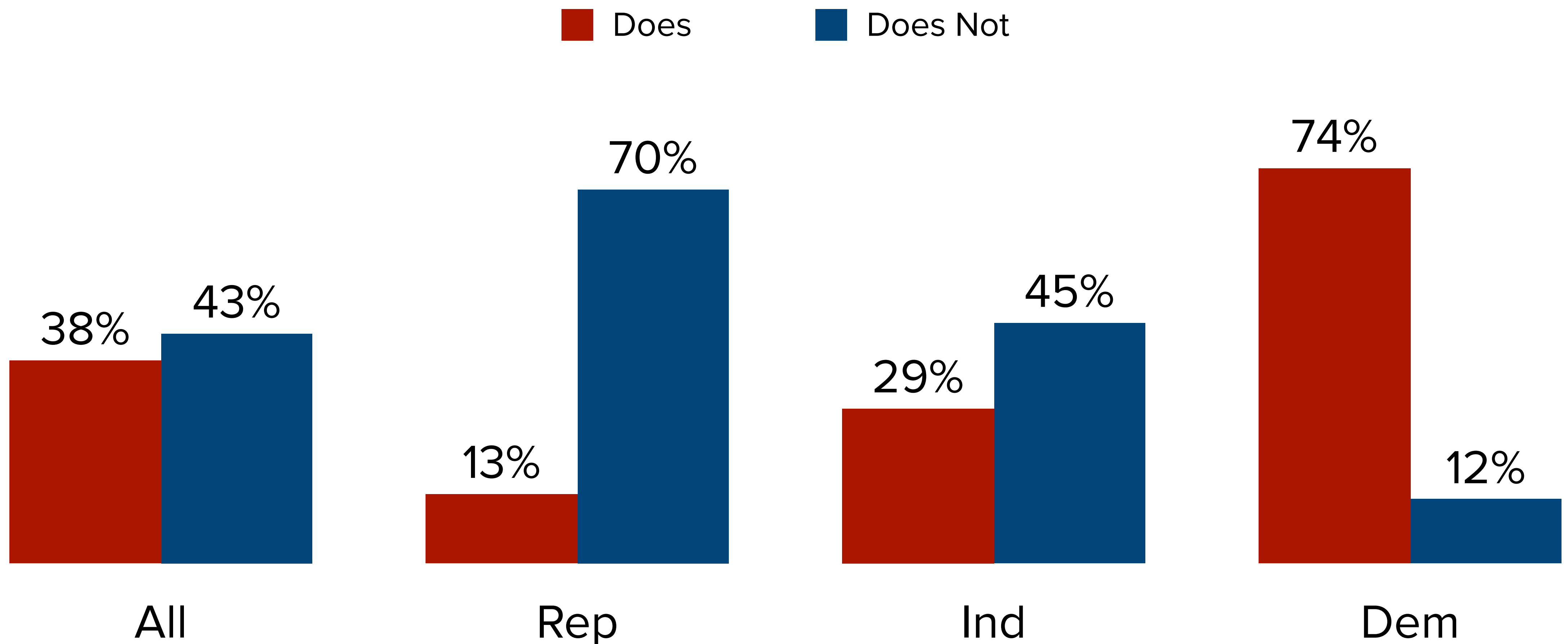
... but even Republicans say they do not.

Voters approach a split on whether Democrats have a clear plan on health care, with independents saying they do not.

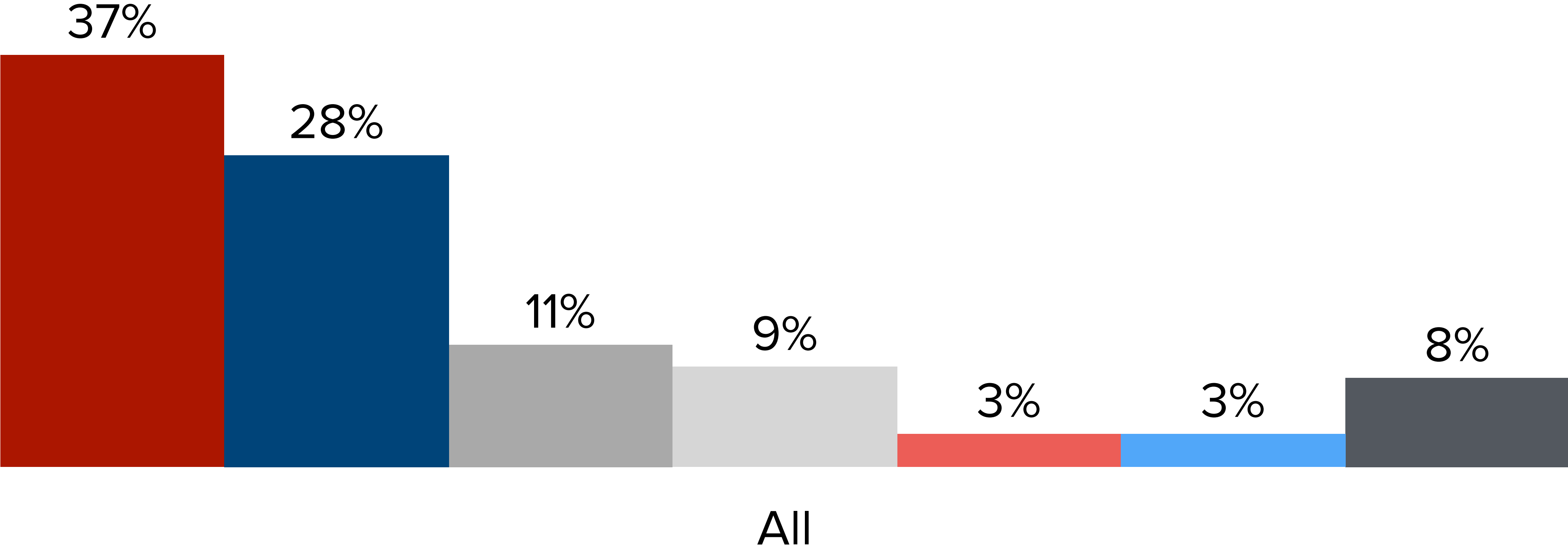
Do you think the Democratic Party does or does not have a clear plan for reforming health care in America?



While much of the debate revolves around the ACA, most voters have job-based insurance ...

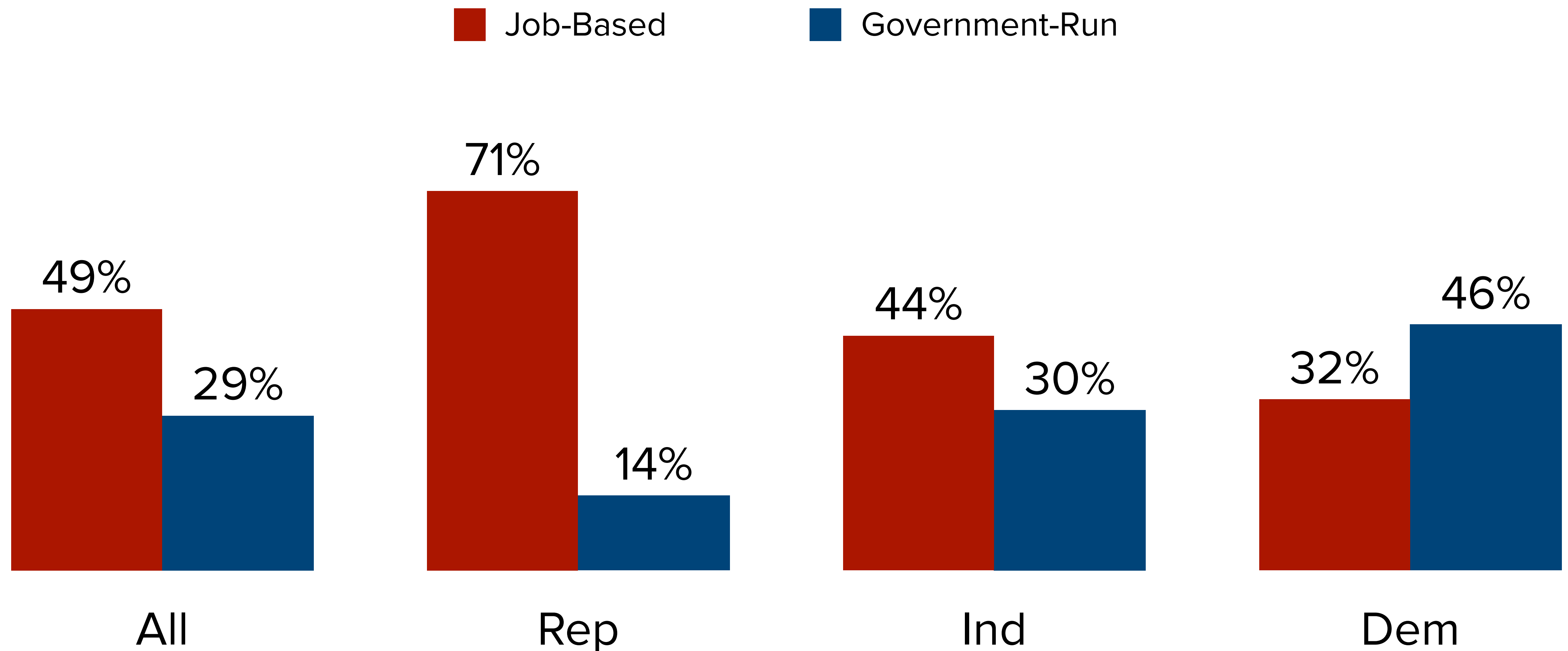
Do you currently have health insurance coverage? IF YES, ASK: Are you covered through insurance you purchase yourself, job-based insurance you receive through your employer, insurance under the Affordable Care Act, or through a government program like Tricare, Medicaid, or Medicare?

Not surprisingly, then, swing-state voters strongly support tax breaks to offer job-based coverage or reduce employee costs.

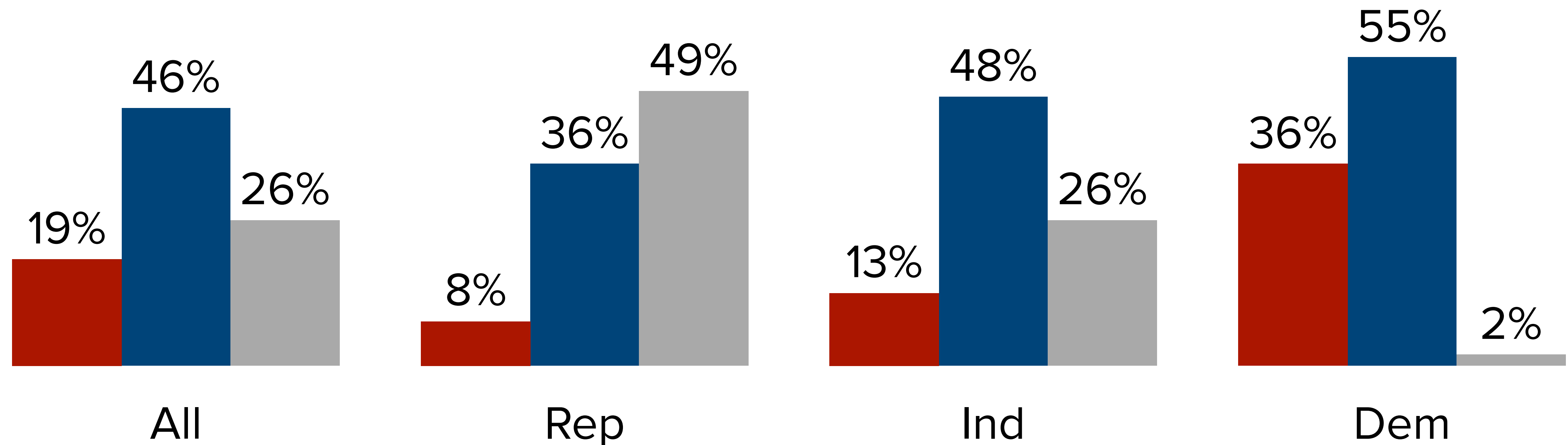

Most voters oppose repealing ObamaCare ...

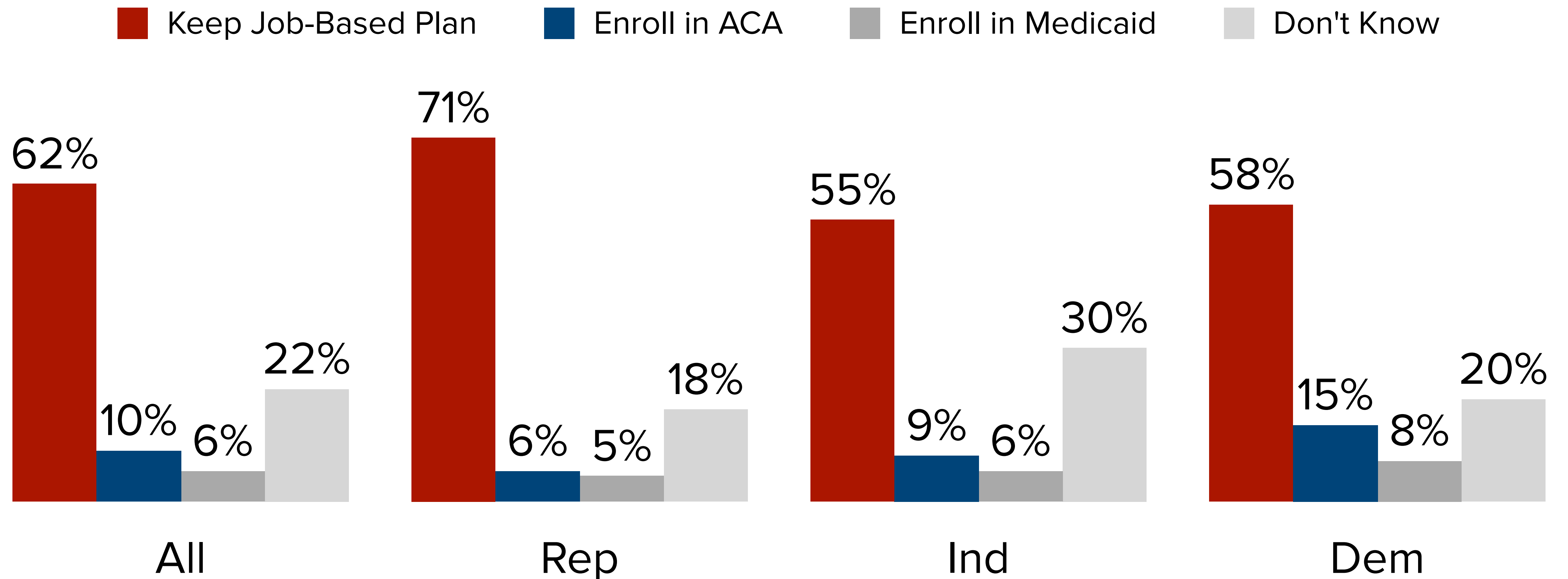
